Truman State University Counseling Annual Report Of Academic Year 2023-2024

This comprises the annual report for Counseling for the academic year covering Fall 2023, Spring 2024, and Summer 2024. It includes a summary of the student demographics and other characteristics, program evaluation results, subsequent program modifications, and other substantial program changes. It also describes the number of graduates for the past academic year, completion rates, the pass rates on credentialing examinations, and job placement rates.

Student Demographics and Characteristics

Tables 1 and 2 describe student demographics and characteristics based on self-report during the application process. Table 1 consists of students offered admission to the program for either Fall 2023 or Spring 2024. Table 2 consists of all students who took classes in the program during Fall 2023, Spring 2024, or Summer 2024.

Applicants must answer the "Date of Birth" and "Sex Assigned at Birth" attributes; choices for the latter are Female and Male. All other responses are optional, and students may select from multiple options. Categories in the table for race and ethnicity reflect university categories. Applicants may write their own descriptors for gender identity. Please note that because applicants can select from multiple categories, percentages may exceed 100%.

The program offered admission to more students than in prior years due to an increased number of applicants. A relatively large number of male applicants received offers and accepted admission, resulting in a five-fold jump from 2.0% to 9.6% of the overall student body. Self-reported racial and ethnic diversity remained relatively flat, but the percentage of unreported demographics increased, possibly a result of a recent Supreme Court decision pertaining to college admissions. Likewise, student body percentages by age stayed consistent, though the newly admitted students were decidedly less rural than prior groups. Thus, the program trended toward urban/suburban and male in its overall composition compared to earlier iterations.

Program Evaluation Results and Subsequent Modifications

Results of the program evaluation comprise the final six pages of this report. In most areas, the faculty opted to continue collecting data, and results from the Counselor Education Comprehensive Examination (CECE) were available for the first time. As an external measure and proxy for licensing exams, the CECE provides an important new source of program evaluation data. Findings for the initial testing cohorts were generally consistent with other data sources.

Last year, the Counseling faculty chose to change the early knowledge measure for Assessment (Student Learning Outcome [SLO] 7). Results improved from 68.4% of students meeting the measure to 100.0%. Changing instructors in the COUN 672G class did not result in a comparable improvement for the early knowledge measure of the Mental Health Counseling (SLO 9) and School Counseling (SLO 10) specializations. After discussion, the Counseling faculty noted that a consistent course instructor might contribute to student success on the item, and they brainstormed additional ideas to implement in 2025-2026 if needed.

Other Substantial Program Changes

Drs. Sandra Garza Ochoa, Anne Metz, and Christopher Todd joined the faculty as Assistant Professors of Counseling, officially beginning in Fall 2024. Dr. Cameron Ortega resigned her position, effective at the end of Summer 2024, and Dr. Elsa Soto Leggett, Truman's Practicum and Internship Coordinator and professor in the program, was elected President of the American Counseling Association for 2025-2026.

The Counseling program saw its first graduates in December 2023 and May 2024, an event celebrated with commencement and Counseling hooding ceremonies. For most of these new alumni, this was followed by licensing exams, initial licensure, and employment in the counseling profession.

Course offerings moved from the Blackboard learning management system to Brightspace, and the university at large discussed a reorganization of its academic components. Students were admitted to the new Rehabilitation Counseling specialization, and the program will seek CACREP accreditation for that degree when appropriate.

Finally, the program was approved for a CACREP site visit for the School Counseling and Mental Health Counseling degrees. This next step in the accreditation process represents a significant milestone for the Truman program toward an accreditation decision from CACREP.

Graduation, Completion, Passing, and Placement Rates

With its initial cohorts completing their degrees, the Counseling program accomplished several firsts. A total of eleven students graduated in December 2023 and May 2024 and were almost evenly split between School Counseling and Mental Health Counseling. Only students who matriculated and remained in a full-time cohort qualified for graduation this first year. Those who began or changed to part-time status had not yet fully met the criteria. Tables 3 and 4 describe the number of graduates and completion rates for Academic Year 2023-2024, respectively.

Shortly after commencement, most new graduates took exams to qualify for initial licensure. School Counseling students took the Missouri Content Assessment (MoCA), and Mental Health Counseling students took the National Counselor Examination (NCE). At the time of the annual report, every graduate who had taken a licensing exam for either the mental health or school domain passed. Results are shown in Tables 5 and 6.
